DX TRIP OF A LIFETIME

Having been a DXer for more than 30 years I was always somewhat in awe of those folks who traveled to exotic places just to put a "rare" country on the air. When, in June 2012 I received an email with a subject line reading "*Swains Island. Want to go*?" Swains is an uninhabited, privately owned island of about 480 acres in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. Although part of American Samoa, Swains is far enough away that it counts as a separate country or "entity" for ham radio's DX Century Club. My first reaction was "Of course I'll go!" Then reality set in: 3-1/2 weeks away from home, 2 weeks on a remote island in a hot & humid climate, the nearest hospital several days away, not to mention the considerable cash outlay. But still...

After several hours I casually mentioned the email to my wife, explaining what few details I knew at that point. Her reaction was "Why don't you go? It's the chance of a lifetime." OK, you've convinced me; when do I leave?

The worst part of the trip was the travel involved. It took three flights (13-14 hours total) and a 22 hour boat trip each way. Although, our boat, the MV Lady Naomi, was of decent size at 150 feet length and the seas were fairly calm, the trip was not very pleasant. The boat did plenty of rocking & rolling and it was nearly impossible to walk on the deck without holding on to something -- anything! The ship was not very clean and seemed to have many times more cockroaches on board than people.

Swains Island itself was very hot with daytime temperatures well over 100° F and nighttime lows of 80-85. We used tents for eating, sleeping, bathing, and for radio operations. We were on a schedule of 3 hours on the air and 6 hours off. With daytime temperature in the sleeping tents reaching 125° F at times it was too hot for sleeping even with fans running. Electrical power was supplied by 5 Generac generators which ran 24/7 without a hiccup, using about 825 gallons of gasoline.

Swains is privately owned, having been purchased in the 1800s for 5 shillings per acre plus a bottle of Gin. It is still held by the same family. We contracted with the owners for use of the island and for all necessary infrastructure. They did an unbelievably great job supplying us with tents, generators, hot meals & snacks, plenty of coffee, drinking water, Gatorade, and even beer! At each meal we had a choice of foods including freshly caught fish and even locally caught lobster.

The total cost for the trip was considerable, adding up to several hundred thousand dollars. Each operator (18 of us) made a substantial contribution. In addition we received donations from numerous individuals, businesses, and clubs, including KARS. Without this generous support the expedition to Swains Island would not have been possible. KARS' own N9IO and N9OE fabricated two patch panels for the expedition. These enabled us to keep the antenna feedlines sorted out and made middle-of-the-night band changes easier. Thanks Bill & Clay. I'd like to also thank the club members who supported Chris through phone calls and offers of help while I was away.

All in all it was a great trip, tough at times but mostly very enjoyable and fun. I'll be saving my spare change because, to quote well known DXpeditioner Martii Laine, OH2BH, "Where Do We Go Next?"

The DXpedtion website, <u>www.nh8s.org</u>, has further information about show. Swains Island and our trip and includes many pictures. There is a video in the works documenting the trip which should be available in a few months. If there is sufficient interest I'll be happy to show the video at a club meeting.

FCC PROPOSES NEW VLF BAND & SEEKS TO ASSIGN PRIMARY STATUS OF THE ENTIRE 160 BAND TO THE AMATEUR RADIO SERVICE

The FCC has proposed a new amateur allocation at 135.7-137.8 kHz...that's right "KILO" Hertz. This is in keeping with international agreements regarding frequency allocation.

The other big FCC proposal is the changing the entire amateur 160 band from 1.8-2.0 mHz to primary status. The upper half of the band has been shared with Radiolocation Services since 1953. There are only 10 federal stations left that are authorized to operate in that frequency range.

Good news for Top Band operators!
