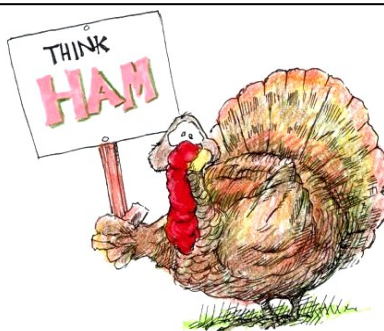
We regret to report the passing of Charles Fregeau N5HSR.

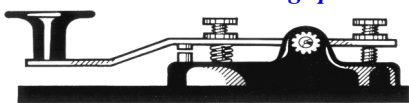

When the call went out for help in hurricane ravaged Puerto Rico, KARS member Val NV9L volunteered. See her story below.

MY TIME IN KP4-LAND POST HURRICANE MARIA

I have recently returned from a 3 week deployment from Hurricane Maria ravaged Puerto Rico. On Friday night September 22nd, the American Red Cross asked the ARRL to assist in putting together a communication team. After having a Saturday conference call, the ARRL decided to come through. They put out the call on social media Sunday looking for volunteers. Jerry and I were on the road returning from W4DXCC in Pigeon Forge when I saw the post. With Jerry's blessing, I applied, leading with my ICS certificates, ARES and Winlink experience. Monday morning Mike Corey from the ARRL called me and conducted a phone interview. Later that day the Red Cross ran my background and credit checks and by Tuesday I had my flight arrangements for a Wednesday flight. The 20 of us that were chosen arrived in Atlanta on Wednesday evening to our awaiting 20 go kits put together by the ARRL. Our go kits contained an IC-7200 for HF, a tuner, a handheld VHF radio, a 40 meter dipole, coax, tools etc. In Atlanta the ARC laptops were passed out so Winlink could be uploaded. Thursday at 4:30 am all 164 ARC volunteers were at the Atlanta airport waiting to board our chartered JetBlue aircraft. It was very impressive how fast both the ARRL and the ARC (American Red Cross) moved to get us in Puerto Rico in less than a week.

We landed at the uncontrolled (look around and hope no other airliner is landing or taking off) San Juan international airport. Upon exiting the aircraft we were met with cheers and applause from the locals.

Words cannot even begin to describe the devastation the good people of Puerto Rico have to face on a daily basis. There was no power in most places in San Juan at this time. No traffic lights anywhere in a city 3 times the size of Dayton. You could be driving down the expressway and then come up on a very large tree just sitting in the right lane. Powers lines were either down or partially down and dangling.

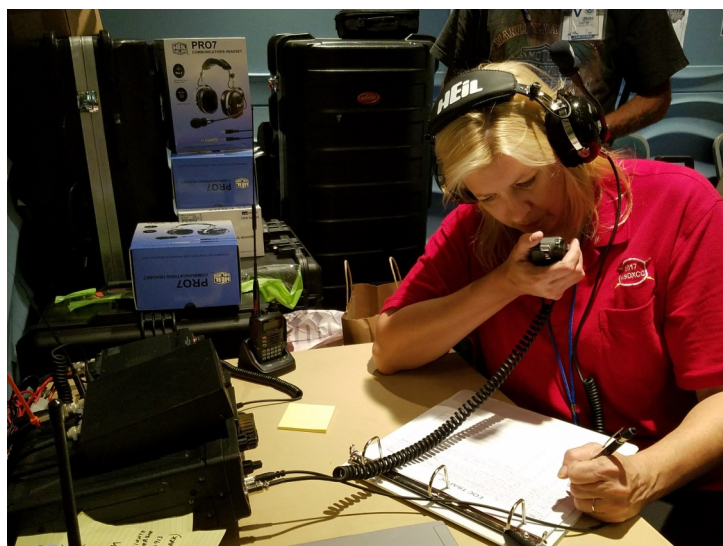
Since we were the first Red Cross workers to arrive, things were chaotic at first...as to be expected. Our mission originally was to go to towns throughout the island with Red Cross teams and enter people's names into an Excel spreadsheet and then send them to be downloaded into the ARC Safe and Well database via Winlink. Within 40 hours of arriving, our mission had expanded to include setting up communications at key spots throughout the island where there was none.

I was assigned with another ham to the EOC, 4 net control operators set up net control at the ARC HQ, and the rest were sent out either on long-term deployments or day trip deployments. It became clear that 22 hams were not enough for what was needed, but we did the best we could

to make do with what we had. Most of the normal everyday traffic, was requests for generator fuel, oxygen tanks, and meds at the hospitals.

Most of us hams also did many things outside the scope of ham radio: fixing generators, donating & delivering food and water, providing medical assistance and even assisting the Army Core of Engineers in securing the dam.

With many of us working 12-15 hour days, the 3 weeks flew by and our deployment ended. This was to the dismay of the hospitals and fire stations that had relied on us for critical communications.

Did everything run smoothly?

Of course not.

Did we provide an invaluable service?

Without a doubt.

Ham radio actually saved lives, since we were the only reliable network of communications on the island. Since this was a first, for a disaster of this scale, we walked away with a lot of knowledge and a lot of ideas on what we can do better next time.
