The KARS September board meeting will be held in the banquet room of El Campesino Mexican restaurant on October 17th. All KARS members and spouses are welcome to attend.

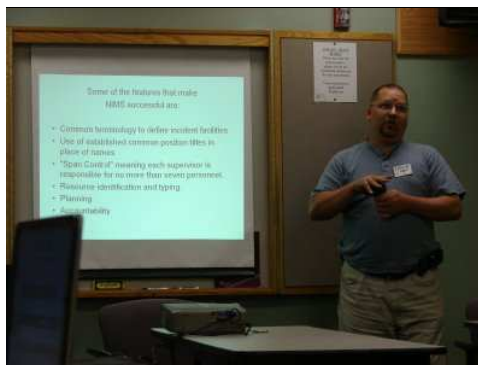

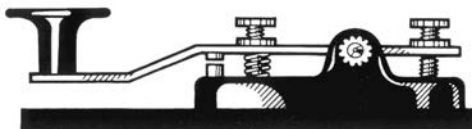

FEMA TRAINING FOR HAMS

With the five year anniversary of the September 11 tragedy, and with the 1 year anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, we are reminded that the actions taken immediately after a major disaster are critical to the final outcome of the recovery operation. The armor of Federal Emergency Management Agency has been tarnished for it's lack of leadership. Some of that criticism is rightly placed, but a critical gap existed in planning at a local and state level which caused the transition from preparation to evacuation to rescue and relief to fail miserably.

Training has long been offered by FEMA to help Emergency Managers prepare for impending disasters. Course ware is available via the Internet to allow users to learn basic terms and functionality of Emergency Management Agencies during an incident. A very basic introduction course is required by most Emergency Management Agencies for all volunteers and is highly recommended by the ARRL for ARES members. Known as NIMS, the National Incident Management System provides a framework on which agencies from the local community to the national level can build their response plans. The major advantage to this approach is that volunteers from any organization can travel to a community in need and know precisely where they would fit into the chain of command at the incident location.

The basic purpose of NIMS to be generic enough to be applicable to the full range of possible hazardous scenarios while improving understanding and cooperation between the different civil and private groups responding to an incident.

Some of the features that make NIMS successful are:

Common terminology to define incident facilities

Use of established common position titles in place of names

"Span Control" meaning each supervisor is directly responsible for no more than seven personnel

Resource identification and typing;
Planning

Accountability

NIMS is one of over fifty courses available through the FEMA Independent Study website.

Certificates are mailed by FEMA after completion of each on-line course.

Certificates can count towards Continuing Education requirements and even college credit.

CW RETENTION 101

One would expect someone who is into code, like me to be pretty much full time using CW a lot, working contests and FISTS sprints and all sorts of contests.

Well quite the contrary. I haven't put Ham radio on the back burner by any means but there have been some things going on in my life lately that have needed attention and I have not had the opportunity to get on the air like I really would have liked to. It has actually been about a month since I have had a long string of QSO's.

After that period of time I thought that I would have forgotten quite a bit. However, I found that because I did take the time to learn the code correctly that it has a lasting impression and after a bit of time passes even though it takes a few minutes or so for me to "get back into the swing of it", I have been able to retain all of the characters and I am pretty close to the speed that I was before, which was about 18 - 20 WPM.

When I learned CW, I had taken my time to learn each letter and number by learning it's unique sound (Dash Dot sequence). I had also learned each at a 20 WPM send speed with a 5 WPM spacing. There was enough time in the 5 WPM spacing to recognize each letter while getting used to the 20 WPM send speed. All that was required was to recognize the letters "faster". I did not have a plateau at 10 WPM like a lot of hams claim to have. I think the plateau comes from learning the code with those alternate methods. The ones like Code Quick, and learning by picturing each character, then trying to decide which letter goes with the picture.

Even the word phrases do the same thing and I think they are more damaging to the user because it is really hard to get those phrases out of our minds. I know this for a fact because when I was searching for a good method for learning the code, I stumbled upon one of these programs and it gave ONE example, I cannot for the life of me get that one letter example out of my mind!!! I am at a point to where I have put it behind me but I don't think I will ever get rid of it totally.

I would like to just make the statement that "If a person would take the time to learn Morse Code the correct way, (Or anything for that matter) no matter how much time passes between on the air contacts, or time spent away from their skill, they would not have much trouble regaining what was learned." Time spent doing something right makes it more enjoyable in the long run.
