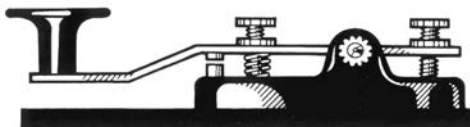

WEATHER ALERTS TO BE MORE FOCUSED

The National Weather Service is re-vamping the way it has issued severe weather warnings for decades with a new system designed to mark a geographic bull's eye where a storm could hit.

According to a recent Weather Bureau release, the system, which went into effect October 1, switches from alerts based on county lines to notices aimed at specific communities.

Using radars and computer modeling programs, the system is meant to predict the moment a storm would hit a community or even a certain cross-roads.

Known as storm-based warnings, the new alerts could reduce a warning area from thousands of square miles to a few hundred square miles, according to weather experts.

Officials say the system also will make it easier to send weather warnings through cell phones and other communications systems, such as ham radio Skywarn units right in the targeted warning area.

Weather Bureau officials say the system is already being used in some weather service warnings which name a county being placed under alert and then specify a certain area that's particularly at risk.

THE SQUEEZE KEY

What is squeeze keying and why should I use it? Well that is a good question and one that has multiple answers.

First of all squeeze keying is mostly used with iambic paddles in the iambic mode. This sounds redundant but really it isn't.

Let me explain...**iambic paddles** are a set of two paddles in a vertical orientation usually side by side with only a few millimeters between each paddle and is keyed by pressing each paddle with your thumb or first finger together depending whether you are right handed or left handed.

In the **iambic mode**, if you press both keys at the same time you get the alternating sounds of the dot and dash: "Dit - Dah - Dit - Dah - Dit - Dah"...until you release the paddles. There are also iambic "A" and iambic "B" modes. One of the modes allows you to end a character without the extra Dot or Dash and the other mode will allow the extra tone to follow if you happen to hold down one of the paddles too long.

I feel that the nice part about iambic Keying is that you can make your characters without having to press the paddles individually for every combination of the dot - dash used in Morse Code. This creates what some refer to as "Slap Keying" where you sort of slap the key around your desk top for every letter, number or pro-sign you do (*Besides, the key doesn't take too kindly to it and this hurts the key's feelings and it won't want to work for you anymore*).

Squeeze Keying is a rather simple process. Let's take a few letters that have combinations of alternating dot-dash tones. If we take the letter "C" for instance we have "___ . ___ ." -or- dah dit dah dit. You could alternate pressing each side of the paddle for each tone of the letter which gives you 4 strokes or you could hold down the "Dash" side of your paddles and interrupt the Dah side with a press of the opposite paddle to insert the "Dit" in the correct places. You end up pressing the key three times for a four stroke letter! Lets take some other letters and check the keystrokes you need...

Regular Keying

B - 4
D - 3
F - 4
G - 3
H - 4
P - 4
Q - 4
X - 4

Squeeze Keying

B - 2
D - 2
F - 3
G - 2
H - 1
P - 3
Q - 2
X - 3



I am not going to publish the whole list of what you can do with your key because by now you should catch on to what I am saying. You can see where in most cases you can almost cut the workload in half by using Squeeze Keying. Considering that the most tones a letter can have is four and then cutting that down by one or two strokes simplifies it a good bit!

All numbers require five tones and by using Squeeze Keying, the numbers now need only two strokes. This saves time when you send a signal report or numbers needed for contesting purposes. I also realize that the whole concept might not really save a whole lot of time and work, but the reality of it is that over the length of a conversation, it can save you from having to work hard making each letter tone for tone.

Using Squeeze Keying is definitely a personal preference. I never really tried to learn how to squeeze key but rather learned it by accident. I noticed that as I was working to get my speed up squeeze keying just sort of happened.

As I mentioned in some of my earlier articles, I belong to some Yahoo groups and I have been reading about the debate as to the benefits of using squeeze keying or not using it. Some try to count each stroke as any movement you make with your fingers, be it a press or release it is still a movement and should be counted as a stroke. I guess that is fair enough but I am not trying to bring up a debate on whether it is proper to use it or not, this is just an idea that I wanted to throw out there for consideration.

I would ask that you would at least entertain the thought of trying Squeeze Keying as a means to better yourself as a CW operator. You never know...you might like the idea and it may change the way you think and feel about CW.
