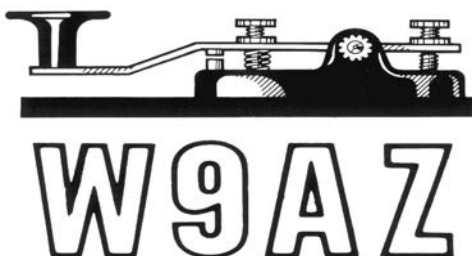

I have found that if APRS were not also a tracking tool and it's only attribute were messaging this would still be equally wonderful and useful for our purposes. Without a doubt, APRS is what packet radio "should" have been 20 years ago. Suddenly I am having the same fun with packet that I did years ago.

The plan is a live demonstration of APRS. I hope to see you all there May 5th.

MY TOWER TALKS TO ME!

No I'm not as crazy as most think I am but as I was standing out on my deck I could hear a faint creaking sound. The wind was gusting to about 35MPH and the strange sound that I was hearing would wax and wane with the wind. I have a Rohn 45 tower that is self supported and still in very good condition with no signs of corrosion or chips in the zinc coating.

I held my ear to one tower section leg and confirmed that the creaking was emanating from the tower itself. Careful examination revealed that one leg of the tower, at the section that attached to the base section, was actually moving, approximately 1/8", as the wind speed rose and fell.

Each leg joint is secured with two zinc coated hex head cap screw and nuts, one 5/16" diameter one 3/8" diameter. I checked both on the affected leg and could not tighten either. After exerting considerable effort I was able to loosen both nuts and then was able to tighten them further than they had been originally. This procedure effectively stopped the movement at the section joint along with the "talking" that I had heard earlier. I listened carefully again, with my ear on a tower leg, just to confirm that there was no other movement or creaking.

SOME NOTES FROM A LOW POWER CONTESTER

Nearly all modern Contest stations, big and small, utilize a computer for contact Dupe Checking and logging. Logging programs like Writelog and CT10 can even control most newer rigs, like reading band data, turn the antenna rotors towards the contact, and even send CW and RTTY using the pre-programmed Function keys on the keyboard. (I like using the F12 Function Key to signal the YL/XYL to bring me another pot of coffee to the shack).

Ever since the release of Windows XP Pro and Home Editions, the Parallel Printer Port has been disabled for Security reasons, until now. Using the Printer port leaves Comm ports available for other uses such as the TNC (for checking spots on the Cluster) or interface to antenna rotors and remote coax switches.

A simple program, Port95nt.exe, originally written as a device driver for a display matrix that uses the parallel port, solves this problem. A Google search lists many websites that have this program available for download.

For most applications, downloading and installing is all that is required. The program only needs to be run once to enable the port. It will also install a Folder in the Program Files called DLPortIO. The two programs in that folder are only run if you wish to view the HEX Address in use or if you want to change it to some other value. In most cases, a HEX Address of &H300 or DEC Address of 768 is used by most logging software and do not require changing.

After installing, reboot the computer. In some cases, entering Setup during boot up and changing the BIOS settings to enable the Parallel Port and setting it to ECP Mode may be required. Some older BIOS may only have ECC and Bi-Directional Mode and not ECP. Try ECC first.

For those of you that want to try it using Windows Vista, the following is a possible solution, although, I have not tried this. Disable UAC before running the port95nt.exe installation program. This works on Vista32. This may work on Vista64 using gpedit.msc (Group Policy Editor) and enable Code Signing for Device Drivers.

1. Launch MSCONFIG by from the windows "Run" menu (Windows key + R, type MSCONFIG, enter).
2. Click on the Tools tab. Locate "Disable UAC"
3. Click the "Launch" button.
4. After the command is done, close the cmd window and close MSCONFIG.
5. Run port95nt.exe and select reboot when prompted
6. Re-enable UAC by repeating steps 1...4 but this time choose "Enable UAC"
7. Done. Now enjoy your victory.

If the above does not work, then just manually copy the dlportio.sys file to the c:\windows\system32\drivers directory.

Having said all that, it is well worth the time it takes to set it up. I have been using this setup for over 2 years now and has worked fine for me.

The alternative...going back to the days of paper logs...Not an Option!

I am no expert on towers but my experience with bearings and blower shafts told me that movement is the first sign of trouble. From now on part of my annual tower check which includes inspection of cables, connectors, cable restraints, and the grounding system, will also include "listening" to the tower itself.

P.S. If you should feel the need to climb the tower, even for a short height, make sure that you use the proper equipment and assistance. Always use a safety belt,

inspect it carefully before each use, and never climb a tower without a spotter. Even a six or eight foot fall can cause serious injury or death. If you do not have the proper equipment leave the work qualified experts. Every year we hear of accidents involving Amateur Radio Operators that fall off of towers. Don't take a chance and make yourself one of those accidents. I guarantee that nearly every one of those victims thought that falling off of a tower "could never happen to me".
